History of the Project


- Researchers and Professors with interests in Rural Sustainability from six Universities in Canada, USA and Mexico

A Brief Review of the Partner Universities: Universidad Autónoma de Aguascalientes



Aguascalientes is located in the central part of Mexico and has a surface of 5,589 square kilometers which represents 0.3 percent of the whole surface in the country; its population is 900,000 people. Its temperature is usually between 17 and 20°C.

The Universidad Autónoma de Aguascalientes (UAA) was created on June 19th, 1973; to this day, it offers high school courses, 52 B. A. programs, 11 M. A. programs and 10 doctorate programs.

The UAA is part of an association of 14 high quality universities; this distinction was obtained once the institution fulfilled external national standard requirements of accrediting organism.

Question:

If I am planning on attending one of the Mexican universities, do I need to speak and write Spanish fluently?

Answer:

Although some courses at the Mexican universities are offered in English, it would be advisable for students to have a working knowledge of Spanish before arriving in Mexico. We are able to support some students in taking Spanish language instruction prior to departing. Spanish language courses also can be taken concurrently at the Mexican universities for students who want to "brush up" on their skills.

Question:

Are the courses offered at the other partner universities transferable back to UNBC to satisfy the requirements of my degree?

Answer:

You will need to contact the international student advisor at the host university to find out what courses are offered in the semester you expect to be abroad and to get more detail on the course content. You will then need to bring this information to your departmental advisor to determine transferability for the courses you intend to take abroad.

Question:

What is the application process to participate in the program?

Answer:

Talk to Alex Mayer (asmayer@mtu.edu, 906-487-3372) to indicate an interest. Then check out the unviersities' websites and contact the international student advisors at the university you wish to attend to find out about course availability, semester dates and other information. Fill out an application form and submit it to by the deadline date. We will get back to you as soon as possible after this date.

Question:

Are funds available to support my study abroad?

Answer:

Yes, part of the grant funding we received for the program will subsidize your study abroad. This includes \$ for travel, accommodation and living expenses, health insurance and language preparation (if needed).

Question:

What is the deadline for application?

Answer:

The deadline for admission to study abroad are

Summer Semester—March 1

Fall Semester—April 1

Spring Semester—October 15

Question:

Will I pay tuition and fees at my host university or at MTU? Answer:

Even though you are studying abroad, you will pay your tuition at MTU. You will not need to pay most MTUstudent fees if you are studying at an out-of-country university.

Question:

Is this program open to graduate students?

Answer:

Yes, undergraduate and graduate students may apply to the program.

Question:

Could the program be extended to more than one semester?

Answer:

We expect that the majority of students will participate in the program for one semester, but it is possible that a student could stay at a visiting university for up to two semesters.

Question:

If I am a foreign student my I participate in the program? Answer:

The program is open only to citizens or permanent residents of the home universities' countries [only US citizens or permanent residents can apply from the US, etc.].

Question:

What makes for a competitive application to the program? Answer:

The application consists of a form, an essay describing the applicant's interest in the program, and two reference letters. Students whose essays indicate that they are familiar with the program and that their interests reflect the program's objectives will be competitive. A competitive student's reference letters should indicate that the student has sufficient maturity to participate in a study abroad program and, for those students interested in the Mexican universities, has sufficient Spanish language skills.

Question:

Could I study at the other university that is located within my own country?

Answer:

No, students can only exchange to universities in other countries.

Question:

What kind of support would be available to me in case of problems or emergencies while studying abroad?

Answer:

Each of the host universities' international programs offices has is well prepared to handle problems or emergencies that may come up during your study abroad. In addition, MTU has well established contingencies for helping students abroad with problems or emergencies.

Question:

Is this program administered through my college's study abroad program or is it a departmental program?

Answer:

This program is administered jointly by your universities' study abroad office and faculty in several departments in your university. The program director, Alex Mayer, is in the Department of Civil & Environmental Engineering. The program director can give you information on the academic aspects of the program, but administrative details, such as supplying and reviewing your application will be handled by the study abroad office.

Question:

Are there any course requirements associated with the program?

Answer:

Yes. All students participating in a semester-long study abroad through this program are required to take the web-based course, "Rural Sustainability," which has been developed and is taught by faculty at all six SustR universities.

Question:

Will there be any essays/presentations/technical reports due at the completion of the program?

Answer:

No, but you will be required to complete a program evaluation survey at the end of your study abroad.

Question:

What kind of internship will be offered? Is it a paid position? Answer:

Internships will consist of positions with university faculty, government agencies, or non-governmental organizations involved in research on rural sustainability issues or rural development. The internships will require about 10 hours per week of effort. The internships will not be paid.

Question:

Is the program open to all majors?

Answer:

Yes.

Question:

What does SUSTR stand for?

Answer:

Good question! SustR stands for Sustainable Development for Rural Communities: Social, Health, Economic, and Environmental Advances.
